MEETING NOTES

These notes taken at monthly meetings are extracted from the Pamlico Amateur Radio Society weekly newsletter, the PARSgram. Although they are not formal minutes, they constitute a record of those meetings.

PAMLICO AMATEUR RADIO SOCIETY (PARS) January 2015 MEETING NOTES * Thirty-eight PARS members and guests attended the breakfast meeting chaired by President Bill Olah, KR4LO, at Brantley's in Oriental last Saturday.

* "Wally" Wallace KK4ASP presented the treasurers report. She is still receiving 2015 membership renewals. If you have misplaced your renewal letter contact Wally. [or just reply to this email and I will forward your request on to Wally--Jim].

* Mike K4HPS gave the ARES Report detailing the activity for the months of October 2014 through January 2015. A Simulated Emergency Test is planned for the Pamlico Emergency Net Practice at 7:30 PM on Wednesday, February 4. The SET will allow testing of the new dual band antenna at the EOC in Bayboro. The Oriental 440 Repeater will also be used for this test. If you have not already done so, PROGRAM YOUR RADIO to use this repeater on the frequency of 444.350 MHz, standard offiset, PL tone 85.4.

* Jim AI4WL reported the VHF SSB bands have been extremely quiet although solar activity has increased recently. (SSN-193, SFI-165, KP-2 at 0700.) No workable stations were heard on 6M during the recent January VHF Contest. He reported that the Navassa Island DXpedition advance group was on the island and operation should start as early as tomorrow, Feb 1. Only Dave, N4ENE reported having KP1 (Special call K1N for this DXpedition) in his log. * Dick, K4JJW wondered if others had worked the Iran DXpedition EP6T on

Kish Island. He apparently was the only one who had.

* After comments regarding the increasing lack of operator couth during the Iran and other DXpeditions, Dick recommended reading "Ethics and Operating Procedures for the Radio Amateur" by John, ON4UN, and Mark, ON4WW. It can be found on the ARRL web site at <u>www.arrl.org/operating-ethics</u> Just click on the document for a download.

* With a surprise presentation of a personally handcrafted "plaque", Bill graciously thanked me for years of producing the weekly PARSgram. I was humbled and without words to adequately respond.

* Jim Scheer, W4NLD, reported on the sale of some donated high value sound

equipment on EBay. Four of the five items listed were sold and he presented Wally with a check for nearly \$400 for deposit to the club treasury.

* Regarding upcoming presentations, Bill advised that a SKYWARN class was being planned as was the club Fox Hunt. Randy, K4WRD, suggested members talk about projects they were working on.

* As for new awards, Sam/Dave KD2T reported that he had received DXCC awards for the 30 Meter band and the 12 Meter band.

* Carl Baxley, KJ4CFG, complemented Bill Michne WM3X on the fine quality of his instruction. (Carl is taking Bill's General class license course.)

* With that, Bill Michne reminded all of the FCC Examination session at 6:30 PM on Monday, March 2nd. It is an open exam to qualify for not only the General Class license but also Technician, and Extra.

* John Keating, KB1KW, of the Carteret County Club talked about the annual Neusiok Trail Run normally held the second weekend in January. He outlined the need for communications support and asked for ours next year. The Neusiok trail is 21.5 miles long running from the Pine Cliff Recreation area on the Neuse river (just east of Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point) to Oyster Point Campground east of Newport, NC. Running this course is a very big challenge and some do it several times as part of the event.

* After the formal meeting, Bill conducted an auction of a large number of electronics items, mostly test equipment, specialized power supplies, wire and cable.

She is still awaiting a few more 2015 membership renewals. If you have misplaced your renewal letter contact Wally [or just reply to this email and I will forward your request on to Wally--Jim].

* Mike K4HPS gave the ARES Report. There were four drills during the month. The test of the new dual band antenna is being rescheduled. Of particular interest is evaluating simplex operation capability with remote stations in the county.

* Greg KM4DZM will be at the VE session Monday [Mar 2]. Expect to see photos on the PARS website soon after.

* Under-utilization of the PARS Website was discussed by Tom, KI4NSP. According to Larry, KK4SEO, our webmaster, there are only 38 regular users and limited activity on the forums. Since the PARSgram is limited to text emails without enclosures or photos, this is the place to go for all the details. The seven forums now cover 54 topics including DX, items for sale, latest on local repeaters, technical issues.... The forums can be expanded with user interests. There is even a page listing the frequencies and tones of our local repeaters. The site has photos of past field days, our trip to the VOA Grimesland Transmitting Site, a video on the Scouts JOTA last year and more. Don't miss the discussion on CHIRP, the free tool for programming many radios using your computer. The URL is <u>http://www.n4prs.org</u> It is easy to get a login and password to access PARS only areas. * Pete AG7C did a quick show-and-tell on Raspberry Pi, the card sized low cost computer. Originally produced in England for learning and experimentation, the device has almost unlimited applications. Pete is considering using it to run his digital computing application and remotely control his antenna rotator. * PARS now has added backup power capability for the Oriental repeater. A local sailor, Doug Siedens donated 6 used 415 Amp Hour, 6V batteries to the club. Bill Olah has found four to be in excellent condition.

* Andy Denmark donated a 5KW generator to club before moving west. With the availability of small quiet generators for Field Day, the very noisy larger generator will be auctioned at one of our future meetings with the proceeds going to the club treasury.

* Field Day planning is going smoothly according to Mike Marsh, K4NLC. PARS will return to the Neuse River site it has used for the past several years.

* Members were reminded of the VE (FCC Examination) Session scheduled for Monday, 6:30 pm, at the Pamlico Community College.

* The Spring Foxhunt will be announced when the weather improves. Contact Randy, K4WRD, to join the group making "tape measure" antennas and for information on building an attenuator for your handheld.

* Jim AI4WL reminded the group about the NC QSO Party and gave a heads-up about the Eritrea DXpedition to be operational the first week in March.

* After a short break, Dick, K4JJW, led a roundtable on working DX, and particularly the DXpeditions to most wanted "countries". He highly recommended reading "Ethics and Operating Procedures for the Radio Amateur" that can be found on the ARRL Website <u>http://www.arrl.org/operating-ethics</u> Dave N4ENE, and others also recommended reading the response by Glenn W0GJ, of the Navassa Island DXpedition to questions posed by the Mediterraneo DX Club, especially, question 3 asking why so many European operators did not make contact. * Thirty-four PARS members and guests attended the breakfast meeting chaired by President Bill Olah, KR4LO, at Brantley's in Oriental Saturday.
* "Wally" Wallace KK4ASP presented the treasurers report. 2015 membership renewals are still slowly coming in. She will provide an updated roster soon.

* Mike K4HPS gave the ARES Report. There were four drills during the month generating 7.63 man hours. He plans to attend the Area 3/4 Meeting on April 18th in Warsaw, NC.

* With few days being exceptions, solar activity has been declining according to Jim AI4WL. He noted that the bands will be active this weekend with the CQ WW WPX SSB Contest. Look for South Cook Island, Reunion Island, "Pleasant Island", and Cyprus this week

They included dropping no longer wanted magazines at public frequented places like doctors offices, barber/beauty shops, libraries; providing license manuals to the school, college, and public library; a float in the Croakerfest Parade. ability to fall back to simplex communications is being re-emphasized despite the ongoing adoption of new voice and digital technology.

A HOT QUIET FIELD DAY ON THE NEUSE [FIELD DAY MONTH, NO MEETING] In the downright hot and sultry weather this past weekend, PARS 2015 Field Day activity was almost all in slow motion. With no one moving fast except when seeking shade, activity was mostly social for the folks that spent some time on the Neuse River site. Even the gulls were having trouble. One dropped a nice young eel on the grass, unable to get it to a shady place to enjoy. Only two hours in, the forecasted storm hit and operations were halted. The halt came just a little early for the well attended annual social and dinner at the Overcash's just down the street. Although propagation was expected to be poor, the group made a good number of contacts with hams in the US, Canada even some DX stations demonstrating we can work "off the grid". As in the past, PARS' low-key mostly daylight operation emphasized the capability for providing emergency communications when needed. A few observations:

o Operations were consolidated on a single lot facing the Neuse and across the street at the Had residence. Dennis, W4USR loaned us his in-place vertical for the weekend. Over the year, a number of the towers we used in the past--the pines along the water-- have been removed reducing our wire antenna options. The vertical was a big help. The VHF beam was put up in his front yard and away from the power lines that have caused noise problems in the past. The two radios were operated protected from the rain in the sunroom. o Our new Honda EU2000 generator worked like a charm, sipped gas, and was very quiet. Randy K4WRD tended to it as if it was a newborn. Even more quiet and economical was Mike Marsh's solar power system.

o We had a first for PARS this Field Day. We were visited by our ARRL Section Manager. Karl Bowman, W4CHX. He arrived during the storm and had dinner with us after briefly visiting the site. Karl talked for a few minutes about the state of amateur radio in North Carolina and the Amateur Radio Parity Act. He appeared genuinely impressed with our club's Field Day effort. Karl was last heard on the repeater heading south for his final stop for the day.

o Although the contacts have not been tallied, probably more CW contacts were made than sideband this year. Fortunately, the expected Coronal Mass

Ejection never arrived. The noise coming out the speakers was mostly atmospheric--lots of static crashes on Saturday. The Magic Band again was fickle. There were very few stations heard and worked on 6 meters Saturday, but we enjoyed a nice opening on Sunday morning. The operator in New Mexico could not believe we were coming to him with less than five watts with our QRP operation.

o Mike Hurm, K4HPS, demonstrated the PARS Amateur Radio Emergency System (ARES) go-pack running it off the solar power set-up. Mike used it to monitor the PARS Field Day talk-in frequency.

* "Wally" Wallace KK4ASP presented the treasurers report.

* Mike Hurm,K4HPS, our ARES EC, detailed ARES activity for May through August: 18 sessions with 49.05 person-hours participation.

* Mike Marsh, K4NLC, is coordinating PARS' participation in the 2015 Pamlico County Heritage Day celebration on Oct 3. Planned is the field day setup last used by Pamlico ARES, possible HF station, both to compare with other forms of communication such as GMRS, family radios, Goal is to inform the public and promote Amateur Radio as an emergency service and as a fun hobby.
